It is important to have quality instead of quantity, in the IYFR movement.


By the time you receive this newsletter many of us will be on the way to Brisbane in Australia for the Rotary International Convention.

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AGM in Brisbane

Due to the costs of travel and lots of other related expenses, most qualified Mariners cannot afford to run for the International Bridge.

If we expect our keen, upcoming volunteer International Commodore to attend all Rotary World Conventions and visit fleets around the world, we should also be prepared to give financial support to this task.

Therefore, the Past International Commodore, Joe Phillips has moved and Incoming International Commodore Bill Robinson has seconded that:

The IYFR General Rule, Section D 2 c. be amended to read that: on change of command the minimum funds, passed on to the following administration be US \$ 10,000.

The present rule allows for US \$ 2,000.

The IYFR General Rules, Section D 2 d. should be amended to read: that the amount of travel expenses be US \$ 10,000 provided that the minimum under D 2 c. are met.

The present rule allows for \$ 3000,00,

Some very good and positive comments has been received already, but we would still like to bear from more members.

If you have not told us already, please express your views and comments on these two amendments.

They will be voted on, at the next Annual General Meeting Tuesday, June 3, 2003.

New Cruising areas The Black Sea,

The black sea is in fact a misnomer. The previous name was Pontus Euxinus, and translated into English it means "The Hospitable Sea"

The first yachting activity took place in the summer of 1997 in the undiscovered waters of KAYRA.

The first rally to cruise the Black Sea was organised by the Atakoy Marina Yacht Club. It was realized the waters had much to offer. We covered six different countries with a wide range of cultures.

It was such a success that each year the rally was repeated. The countries visited were Bulgaria, Romania, Ukraine, The Russian Federation, Georgia and Turkey.

Visiting Yachtsmen were welcomed everywhere by local citizens and with an open attitude.

Kayra made headlines in many news papers. TV programmes were made and visitors looked forward to repeating their experience. The success could never have happened without the painstaking step by step planning of the Atakoy Marina and the Atakoy Yacht Club, under the leadership of its President Sedat Altunay.

The difficulties have been overcome, by sowing seeds of unity among the Black Sea countries.

The rallies hit their targets – to get new leisure activities established in the Black Sea. This has certainly not been overlooked by the Ukraine Ministry of Tourism as Mr. Altunay received The Medal Of Honour, for outstanding achievements for this region.

The pictures to the right illustrate the cruising areas in the "Hospitable Sea"

So successful were the rallies that the Ministers of Tourism called a meeting in Turkey and resolved to establish the Black Sea Cruising Association.

Mr Sedat Altunay was elected President for a period of four years.

Atakoy Marina Yacht Club is a members club, open to the owners of visiting yachts from abroad.

Situated at the end of the breakwater the luxurious and air conditioned Clubhouse provides comfort and meals and wines to an international standard. The private lounge is an excellent place for business meetings or for a social gathering after a day a sea. Next to the Clubhouse is a 20 metre salt water swimming pool with a terrace bar also serving snacks. This is a wonder place for a sundowner as there is an uninterrupted view over the sea.

Atakoy Marina Yacht Club is one of the sponsors of KAYRA and MAYRA thus assisting in the opening of other ports and countries to yachting tourism. Sedat Altunay is a Rotarian and belongs to the Rotary Club of Kadikoy, and likewise a member of IYFR and Commodore of the Mamara fleet.

 - -numerous and different local yachting events scheduled during each year for your enjoyment.
 - -adventures to close and far-away lands, fun parties and hilarious boat activities.
- Because you will be invited to enjoy inter-fleet exchanges, regattas, yachting racing and land touring with others from IYFR's more than 100 fleets around the globe.
- Because the IYFR has a splendid Annual General Meeting (AGM) luncheon and fun for you to enjoy
 and, whenever possible, puts on a Post Convention Cruise for the exclusive enjoyment of lyforians and
 their guests.
- Because it can enhance your enjoyment of life and make Rotary itself much more meaningful. Many Rotarians maintain their Rotary membership because of their affiliation with the International Yachting Fellowship of Rotarians.

HOW TO FORM A NEW FLEET

The following notes are for general guidance for any Rotarian "creator" interested in forming a new fleet. A successful fleet can be launched with 20 members or as few as 10, provided that those members are sufficiently keen. Since "fellowships are among the best kept secrets in Rotary", your area IRRC has been trained to assist you as your assistant to get a fleet started.

Each IYFR Region has an International Regional Rear Commodore (IRRC) as the International Commodore's (IC) representative. Their function is to be a "Creator's Helper" to you, the "Fleet Creator", to help expedite the creation of your successful fleet. Use your IRRC as an advisor and please contact the international office, directly, for paper work details and other assistance.

"Feasibility Committee"

Before you get started you may want to form a "Feasibility Committee". Gather together a few Rotary friends with an interest in boating and tell them that you feel it would be of value to Rotarians and the community to form a Yachting Rotarian fleet in the district. Brief them about the IYFR and give them a copy of the IYFR Brochure. Ask them if they agree that a fleet should be started and get their help to share Rotary's best kept secret with their Rotary club by making a short presentation at a Club meeting. They can sign up applicants "on the spot" and leave copies of the brochure with the Club.

The IYFR member, for 36 years, Bob Cole from Great Britain celebrates his 90th birthday on the 26th June 2003.

Bob is a boat builder by profession and known as a tireless supporter of giving sailing opportunity to others, especially young and had the bandicapped.

From the age of 13 he sailed as an oyster fisherman in the winter months and in the summer on "Gentlemen's" yachts, notably on the 12 metre "Clymene" and later on the motor sailor "Fidelma"

In 1939 Bob joined the Navy and was posted to HMS "Europa" and later to a wooden fishing vessel that was to

be used as a minesweeper in the North Sea. A mine exploded directly under the boat and all crew, except two were killed.

In 1930 he and a few others formed the Burnham Sailing Club and raced 16 footers and Squibs until he was 80.


He joined the boat building yard Tucker Brown and retired in 1980.

By joining Rotary in 1967 Bob was able to support all the organisations he became involved in, particularly the Handicapped Children. He is a great supporter of The Jubilee Sailing Trust and devoted many hours to the vessel "Lord Nelson"

He is Vice President of United Hospitals Sailing Club and also Flag Officer of the Royal London Hospital Sailing Club.

Bob Cole has a remarkable lifetime record of involvement in sport.

As Commodore, I visited many of these events and will be joining the two Scottish Fleets in September, for a cruise on the Clyde.

The whole weekend was a great success and a chance to meet up with old friends and make many new. We now look forward to the next weekend gettogether by the Lake Windemere in the Lake District.

From Seattle,

Fleet promotion and the regional Mariner fellowship activities are a major emphasis of activities in the Pacific North West region of the Americas.

The Seattle Mariners Fleet (formed in 1949) are having a rendezvous in Victoria, British Columbia during the District 5030 conference, and are working with PDG Bob Wilson and Regional Commodore Dave Kelly to promote IYFR and the formation of a new Cascade Fleet during the conference.

A new Columbia River fleet is in the making for Rotary Mariners living in the greater Portland, Oregon and Vancouver, Washington area.

PDGs (5010) and Independent IYFR members Alana Bergh and Lloyd Morris are exploring development of a Mariner fleet in Alaska.

As a result of Pacific Northwest connection with Russia and our involvement to extend Rotary in Russia, we are working with four Rotary clubs in the Lake Baikal region of Siberia to form what may be the first IYFR fleet in Russia. (There are 70 Rotary clubs in Russia). With the help of District 5010 Governor Elect Vladimir Donskoi from Irkutsk, and the District 5030 Seattle number 4, the Russian Rotary Matching Grant Program, the Lake Baikal Rotarians are planning a "Kayaks for Kids" project to take disabled children who have been confined in institutions, out in double kayaks to experience the joys and freedom of kayaking.

At the 7th Annual meeting for Extending Rotary in Russia, we met a Rotarian from Vladivostok. He had researched Rotary Fellowships and was very enthusiastic about starting a fleet.

Networking and fleet development are important. We developed an IYFR brochure for use with our local fleet development that can be easily adapted for fleets and fleets in formation in other regions. If you would like a copy, please send me a message at: wtr@ wtrobinson.com.


We will discuss fleet development brochures and other promotional materials at IYFR meetings in Brisbane during the RI convention, and will make these available on the IYFR website.

Motor Yacht "ROTAYAT"

Most Rotarians are interested in sailing and love to be on water. However, it is not always easy for an individual to purchase a large boat.

Supposing you could afford such an investment, even then the maintenance requires a substantial amount of your budget and lots of time, which can create overwhelming problems.

However, we must have hobbies and allow time for recreations to make life worthwhile. Therefore, we should look for other solutions as a compromise. A compromise that can satisfy our financial resources and dreams. Turkish IYFRians have come up with a solution. They commissioned a yacht to be used collectively.

An incorporated company has been established and some sixty shareholders have joined the company so far.

Even some IYFRians from overseas, such as Dr. Joe Shirley and Mrs. Roselyn Pierce from Texas Fleet joined the company.

The yacht is named M/Y "ROTAYAT". Rota, in Turkish Maritime language means "course".

She is a 22.5 m (73.77 foot) steel yacht powered by two diesel engines.

Capacity is 100 people for day excursions and cocktails on the main and sun deck, or 70 people seated around tables at lunch or dinner meetings The yacht will serve as a training boat for Coastal Navigation, Nautical Astronomy, Seamanship, Meteorology, Oceanography, Rules of "Road", Signaling, Anchoring, Mooring, Steering, GPS, Radar. E/S reading, Chart work etc. for Rotarians who want to obtain a certificate as Yacht Skipper.

Likewise training will be offered to outstanding school pupils and sea scouts.

The yacht will welcome visiting IYFRians for cruises along the "Bosphorus" strait of Istanbul and around the Princess Islands.

In order to cover operational and running expenses and repay our initial investment, M/Y "ROTAYAT" will be used commercially for day and night cruises and cocktails, dinners, lunches for VIP clients and major corporations as well.

The yacht also will occasionally be available to entertain teachers, students, orphans, handicapped, veterans and retired dignitaries on special dates.

Likewise for GSE teams and exchange students, the IYFRian yacht will also be an additional attraction for Turkey.

We extend herewith an invitation to all Rotarians, and Rotary Mariners to participate in this investment and become a part owner in this fine craft.


