INTERNATIONAL COMMODORE'S MESSAGE

On Isla del Este (East Island), two hours by boat from Buenos Aires

Dear lyforians, friends:

These last months have been very exciting to me: Alicante and a new fleet.

Alicante was superb. We must bow in homage to the organizer, Area Commodore Robert Burns. The place was well chosen. The city and the landscape. The local people also very cordial and easy going. The hotel, very well placed (the elevators not so good) in a beautiful scenery.

As planned, we took a boat to see the start of the Volvo race from a very short distance. The racers passed several times in front of us. On a ship close was the ex king of Spain, the father of the present king of Spain, Felipe VI.

We visited the old city, with its narrow streets that have been in use since centuries ago. Finally, we had the AGM proper.

We went from one to the other all the regions of the Area. It should not have been too much of a surprise, to see so many countries, of different nationalities and languages pass by. All this is on the Web. Anyway, it's striking to see the problems involved. In one case, in a country on the Black sea, in a previous regime, they were not allowed to sail, in case people would run away to another country. The problem of the languages itself is a huge one. A lot of people don't speak English.

When my time came to talk about Area 2, I said that it was very simple: 14 fleets in North America that all speak English and 9 fleets in South America, all of them Spanish speaking.

Touching this point of languages, here is the place to remark how the common tongue has allowed the development of the WhatsApp group among the Southern ivforians. The common instrument of expression allows puns and play of words that unite the people speaking or writing. We have now Spaniards and also Italians, counting in the similitude of these two languages.

On the subject of the new fleet, we had to change the name of the region from South America to Latin America, being that Mexico is beyond its limits.

Very sad for me, I couldn't come to the charting ceremony, but our Area Commodore, Angie, did the job.

The bridge of the Cancun fleet immediately joined the

WhatsApp group and we are now chatting every day.

According to me, this is the essential of the Fellowship:

making friends and having a good time together.



ITINERARY

Thursday, June 28, 2018

Fly from Toronto (YYZ) to Victoria (YYJ).

Recommended Accommodations, Two Streams:

Stream 1- Travel and stay aboard a charter (rental) boat in Sidney, BC at Coopers Boating, 9835 Seaport Place, Sidney, BC V8L 4X3 (5 Kilometers from the airport).

Stream 2- Stay at the Hotel Grand Pacific, on Victoria's Inner Harbour for three nights (27KM from the airport – Shuttle Bus or Taxi), and spend the fourth night at the Sidney Hotel & Spa near the Port Sidney Marina.

Friday, June 29, 2018

Stream 1 – Sail/power approximately 25 Nautical Miles from Port Sidney, BC and dock in the Victoria Inner Harbour in front of the Empress Hotel, near the Hotel Grand Pacific. If you wish, there are Rotary Mariners with local knowledge who have volunteered to accompany you on the Friday, Saturday, and/or Sunday to make it easier for you to navigate in these waters. When making your moorage reservation at the Greater Victoria Harbour Authority Phone 1-877-783-8300 or 250-383-8326, http://www.gvha.ca/marinas-facilities/marinas/reservations, reservations@gvha.ca mentioned that our group booking is under "Rotary Mariners".

Stream 2 - Explore Victoria, such as visit the famous Butchart Gardens, the Royal BC Museum, CFB Esquimalt Naval & Military Museum, whale watching tour, wine tour, or sightseeing tours by bus, pedal cab, harbour ferry, etc. Victoria is a "walking friendly city". A PCC reservation form will be available later in the year that will list some of the attractions in Victoria, the costs, and the website where you can get additional information and buy your tickets in advance if you so wish. Streams 1 and 2 Meet & Greet in the Hotel Grand Pacific ballroom. Substantial appetizers served, and cash bar. Meet your old and new friends from around the world, and your local IYFR hosts, and perhaps review plans for the next few days.

Saturday, June 30, 2018

Tour the Victoria Harbour and waterfront aboard your own charter boat, or aboard your assigned host boats, eventually anchoring in Esquimalt Harbour, home of the Royal Canadian Navy Pacific Fleet, for lunch. Sunday, July 1, 2018

Canada Day - help your fellow Canadian IYFR Mariners celebrate Canada's 151st birthday. At 10:45 view the Victoria Harbour Ferry Water Ballet from the boats at the docks.

Hosts and guests board charter boats & host boats to transit from Victoria to travel to Port Sidney Marina (25 Nautical Miles). When making your moorage reservation mentioned that our group booking is under "Rotary Mariners". For reservations at Port Sidney at Port Sidney, phone 250-655-3711 or go to http://www.portsidney.com/reservations. Cooper charter boats have free moorage at the Port Sidney Marina.

Those not billeted on boats (Stream 2) will make their way to the Sidney Pier Hotel & Spa at 9805 Seaport PI, Sidney, BC V8L 4X3 by shuttle bus, taxi, or with local Rotarians with cars.

Reception under the tent on the docks at Port Sidney, followed by bussing to the Closing Banquet, which will be held at the nearby Capital City Yacht Club (maximum sit-down diner for 120 people, so book early.).

For Stream 1: Cooper Boat Charter Company has a base at Port Sidney, a 5 km, 10-minute taxi ride from the Victoria International Airport (YYJ). http://cooper-boating.com/ourFleet.

There is a fully stocked grocery store at the head of the dock in Sidney, and a liquor store is nearby. There are other charter companies in the area as well, but Cooper's is the biggest, and can bring in boats from its other two bases as well, if needed, and is offering the 10% Rotary discount from the prices advertised on the website. The sooner you book, the more likely you are of getting the boat that you prefer.







Our skipper Pepe was excellent. We were told he was not a 'cooker' but he cooked us a wonderful lunch with some fish he caught off the stern of the boat.

The seas were only lumpy on Wednesday morning when we were motoring to Tabarca Island before we switched to plan B and headed for El Campello instead. The winds were supposed to be non-existent but they seemed to come in every afternoon to provide good sailing on a 54ft boat.

It was a nice relaxing end to a wonderful time in Spain with our IYFR friends.



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OPERATION BARRACUDA





All began in 2014 when, after having chartered the first three East African IYFR Fleets, IYFR discovered that, yearly, in African lakes or seawaters they are dying by the thousands; drowning. IYFR realized that owing to an apparently endemic lack of swimming ability among seafarers and the lack of lifejackets, be these fishermen or travelers by canoe/boat on rivers and lakes, a real tragedy was (and unfortunately still is) going on.

The Italian Fleets, thanks to a smart idea by the RC Luigi Norsa, carried out a first brilliant operation in which almost four thousands of still perfectly seaworthy lifejackets were gathered, stored and then shipped to Kenya, Uganda, Rwanda and Ivory Coasts. The local Fleets Officers with the aid of Rotary Club Presidents distributed all of them exactly where they were needed most: Island based Schools and coastal fishermen who could not afford to buy one locally. This Service might already contributed to save some human lives; saving even only one would have been fully rewarding for the Fleets, Rotary Club, IYFR and for all the Rotarian Family. For sure, it generated and not only locally, a high visibility for Rotary and IYFR in perfect accordance with our guidelines.

Unfortunately, many a problem with the local Customs Authorities had to be overcome: they wanted to impose taxes even on these safety and given for free gear and being the request still very high for lifejackets, this challenged our IYFORIAN fellow minds on how to solve the problem.

The 2016 the International Commodore Jun Avecilla and the Philippine Fleets come out with a home-made and rather cheap lifesaver device made of a plastic net bag with 2 -4 empty plastic bottles secured inside. This was an absolutely brilliant emergency floating device but rather difficult and too much bulky to be worn day and night by a professional fisherman.

Luigi Apuzzo, the Roma Fleet Commodore, tested a modified version of this Philippine SALBA BOTE (=life Jacket) but before starting the production, our Kenyan Fellow Mariners notified that the problems with the Custom Authorities might be still worsened; so we totally altered course in order to take care of all the new inputs.

By the end of 2016 the final program to produce at least 3.000 life jackets started to be fully configured: IYFR would not only be giving in Africa 3.000 brand new lifejackets but... would have

them produced locally by local workers working in full accordance with the local rules. Possibly the row materials like the polypropylene fabric and soft foam were to be found locally like any machine to cut, saw and assemble them. The raw materials local producers were unfortunately not found so Italian manufacturers were requested to produce and ship them to Mombasa and be retrieved from a well known not for profit Association operating in Kenya: the ONLUS KARIBUNI.

Good wind and favorable Seas to **OPERATION BARRACUDA!**

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The young Kenya Commodore Simone Avola, who is also the RC Watamu President, is to provide the spaces for the shop and the stores in his Resort named BARRACUDA in Watamu. Being this also the place where the 3 East African Fleets were chartered (in the background of the last picture), it came natural to name this important Service: OPERATION BARRACUDA.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL and IYFR will so provide work and a good salary for 5-6 local lucky workers. The Manager of this mini enterprise will be the Past Secretary of the Kenya Fleet Hilary Mazzon who, in the past has also been a Member of the NON FOR PROFIT Organization KARIBUNI whose President is the Rotarian Gianfranco Ranieri from Como D2042 Italy. So a new important synergy has been established in that KARIBUNI, (a Kenyan ONG operating in the field of schooling and assistance of the disadvantaged classes) can land a hand in the shipping part of the Project. And not only in that. The evenience of an auto sustaining possibility for the years to come is still under evaluation.

Moreover, up to this point, nothing had been made in order to improve the local population ability to swim. The ROMA FC Luigi Apuzzo come in rescue once more time: participating to a meeting with the Monaco Princess Charlene (a past South Africa swimming champion) he asked her if she too could lend a hand. She graciously agreed and now we are setting up in Watamu a swimming school that will be frequented (with the agreement of the local Authorities) by all the kids aging 10 to 13 years.

LAST BUT NOT LEAST: a GLOBAL GRANT for about 45-50.000 Euro is being requested c/o the President and Governor of RC Chiavari Tigullio and Rotary District 2032, where the idea was originated.

IYFR is proud to have conceived this ambitious international project and all of us are doing our best, cooperating with the RC Chiavari Tigullio D2032, the District Governor, with other Italian, French and German Rotary Club, to turn it out into a successful Service.



ACROSS THE BALTIC IN A WHEELCHAIR

Ueckermünde. Since ten years an association on the coast of Mecklenburg runs/has a tall ship on which persons in wheelchairs can experience sea, wind and waves.

Fellowships are groups in which Rotarians can practise their hobbies and passions. But as members of a fellowship they are also committed to the rotarian Service Above All idea. The sailors of the Fellowship Fleet North East as well as RC Ueckermünde-Heide are engaged in the inclusion of handicapped (people) in sailing. In order to do so they promote the work of the "Wappen von Ueckermünde" which is the only tall ship in Germany capable of taking wheelchair users on board. The ship – once christened by the former First Lady Luise Köhler – now celebrated her tenth anniversary.

For experts: The "Wappen von Ueckermünde" is a 22 metres long fore-and-aft ketch carrying 235 square metres of sails. On board there is room for ten passengers including four wheelchair users who can use their own wheelchairs or one belonging on board. The ship is completely accessible for wheelchairs. So far this could be experienced by about 3000 people who covered more miles than are needed for a world cruise in day trips or longer cruises. (more information on www.rollisegler.de)

Fully integrated

Naturally all passengers are included in the work on board. Recently wheelchair user Marlen Deutsch expressed her thanks for a special but at the same time especially strenuous ocean experience: "After

the cruise I realized how many muscles I have got." The state of Mecklenburg -Vorpommern - represented by Patrick Dahlemann (Secretary of Vorpommern) at the anniversary celebrations – is proud of the wheelchair-sailing ship but sees moreover an additional aspect of the project: "Accessibility, greatest possible inclusion of all areas of life is also an economic question for a country where tourism is so very much important."

The somewhat different club cruise

Hans-Georg Führer who has accompanied the project for Rotary from the very beginning, tells about various support actions of the fellowship fleet and his (Rotary) club. If Rotarians are interested in club cruises to Kopenhagen or the island of Bornholm, he will be happy to arrange cruises across the Baltic Sea, because this contributes to the financing and therefore maintaining of this unique offer.

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MIT DEM ROLLI ÜBER DIE OSTSEE

Fellowships sind Gruppen, in denen Rotarier ihren Hobbies und Leidenschaften nachgehen. Aber nicht nur. Auch als Mitglied einer Fellowship bleibt man dem rotarischen Service Above Self verpflichtet. Die Segler der Fellowhip-Flotte Nordost sowie der RC Ueckermünde-Heide engagieren sich deshalb für die Inklusion von Behinderten in den Segelsport. Dazu fördern sie die Arbeit der "Wappen von Ueckermünde", des einzigen Großseglers in Deutschland, auf dem auch Rollstuhlfahrer mitschippern können. Das vor zehn Jahren von der Frau des damaligen Bundespräsidenten Luise Köhler getaufte Schiff feierte jetzt Jubiläum in seinem Heimathafen Ueckermünde.

Für Fachleute: Die "Wappen" ist ein 22 Meter langer Kielkreuzer/Spreizgaffelketch mit 235 Quadratmeter Segelfläche. Zehn Personen können mitfahren, darunter vier Rollifahrer, die ihren eigenen Rollstuhl nutzen können oder einen bordeigenen. Das Schiff ist komplett barrierefrei. Das konnten bislang rund 3000 Mitsegler erleben, die auf Tagestörns oder mehrtägigen Ausflügen mehr Seemeilen zurückgelegt haben, als bei einer Weltumsegelung anfallen. (Näheres unter www.rollisegler.de) Dabei sind alle Passagiere selbstverständlich in die Arbeit an Bord einbezogen. Rolli-Fahrerin Marlen Deutsch bedankte sich kürzlich für ein besonderes, aber eben auch besonders anstrengendes Meer-Erlebnis: "Nach der Fahrt habe ich gemerkt, wie viele Muskeln ich habe.

Rotary Club Trieste is actively and continually involved in initiatives aiming to support disabled sailing. One of the projects is that of the Rotary Camp of Ankaran-Ancaran, on the Slovenian coast near the border to Italy, in an excellent structure belonging to the Red Cross. Since 2009, the Rotary Club in Muggia, Koper-Capodistria and Trieste, offer one week of hospitality to a group of disabled girls and boys from Italy, Slovenia, Croatia and Austria, together with their accompanying families.

From 2015, the IYFR Norther Adriatic Fleet started to contribute to the Camp, providing motor boating in the Gulf of Trieste employing the race committee boats generously provided by the local Yacht Clubs (Yacht Club Adriaco and Società Triestina della




Vela). In the last two years, the possibility to try real sailing was provided thanks to the Fair Play Association, and its instructors experienced with disabled crews, who let the individual guest of the Camp to sail a Bahia dinghy.

Incidentally, Fair Paly Association is running an outstanding program of sailing for blind persons, which are trained to sail a small centreboard boat, the Laser; several services, including the supply of acoustic buoys, were made to support to this activity.

Further initiatives and services regarded the promotion of the participation of disabled sailors to great international sailing events, such as the Barcolana Race in Trieste. In 2012, the North Adriatic Fleet presented a perennial IYFR Trophy to the organizing club, to be awarded to the best-classified boat with a crew including a disabled sailor. In 2016, a similar IYFR Trophy was presented to the Island Sailing Club, which organizes the Round the Island Race in Cowes, Island of Wight.

Moreover, a project of exchange of disable sailors between the two events, Barcolana Race in Trieste and Round the Island Race of Cowes, the International disabled Exchange (IDE), was devised and realized in 2017 by the North Adriatic Fleet. Three disabled sailors and two accompanying friends participated to the Round the Island Race in June, on a boat chartered by the Fellowship, entered as IYFR Trieste.

One more disable friend was on board the catamaran of Gwennilli Trust, a charity very active in UK for the promotion of disabled sailing.

Through the services of the Fleet, a group of two ladies and two gentlemen disabled sailors were invited to Trieste, and participated to the Barcolana race in October, on boats of local friends happy to have on board British and additional Italian disabled sailors.

Support was also provided as a service to Associazione Fair Play, for entering (and finishing with a good scoring) the Barcolana race with a boat with a crew of four blind sailors accompanied by a sighted instructor-navigator.

All this was possible thanks to the generous and substantial financial support of Prosecco DOC, which also provided several pre- and post-race Prosecco parties, which were extremely appreciated. A similar generous support was provided in Cowes by the Royal London Yacht Club and in Trieste by the Società Triestina Sport del Mare with their structures and facilities.

These services received the patronage of Federazione Italiana Vela, (ITALIAN SAIL FEDERATION) and were supported in UK by the Sailability organization of the Royal Yachting Association, and are planned to continue also in the forthcoming years.

Il Rotary Club Trieste è impegnato assiduamente in iniziative di sostegno dei disabili. Da anni, assieme al Rotary Club Muggia e di Capodistria-Koper, con il Trieste Nord, è coinvolto nell'organizzazione del Camp che dal 2009 ospita nella struttura del centro marino della Croce Rossa Slovenia di Punta Grossa, a pochi passi dall'ex confine con la Slovenia di Lazzaretto, per la durata di una settimana, un gruppo di persone diversamente abili italiane e slovene, austriache e croate con i rispettivi accompagnatori, per una settimana di vacanza arricchita da attività terapeutiche e ricreative.

A partire dal 2015, tra le offerte di animazione del Camp sono state realizzate con la collaborazione della Flotta dell'Alto Adriatico dell'International Fellowship of Rotarians (IYFR), mattinate nautiche, con navigazione nel golfo di Trieste con imbarcazioni a motore ed a vela.

A ciò si è aggiunta anche la possibilità per gli ospiti più giovani di provare a navigare attivamente la navigazione a vela con un'imbarcazione olimpica della classe Laser, grazie alla disponibilità degli istruttori specializzati dell'Associazione Fair Play di Druso Nordio.

Incidentalmente, il Rotary Club Trieste ha sostenuto la lodevole attività di quest'associazione, che realizza la pratica della vela con imbarcazioni Laser per non vedenti, fornendo con un service le boe acustiche che consentono loro la precisa localizzazione di riferimenti nell'area di navigazione.

Un'ulteriore iniziativa è stata quella di promuovere la partecipazione di velisti disabili alla nota regata Barcolana. A partire dal 2012, il Trofeo appositamente istituito (International Disabled Exchange, IDE) su iniziativa della Fellowship viene assegnato ogni anno all'imbarcazione meglio classificata durante la premiazione della manifestazione.

Un'altra manifestazione simile alla Barcolana, per partecipazione e notorietà, è la Regata intorno all'isola di Wight in Gran Bretagna. Un Trofeo simile a quello della Barcolana, riguardante le imbarcazioni con un equipaggio comprendente velisti disabili, è stato istituito, ancora su iniziativa della Fellowship, a partire dal 2016.

Il progetto per il 2017 è stato quello di consentire ad un gruppo di velisti disabili ed armatori che con essi hanno partecipato alla Barcolana, di partecipare alla Regata attorno all'Isola di Wight. Un gruppo di quattro velisti e due accompagnatori si è recato a Cowes, sede a terra della regata che si è svolta il giorno 1 luglio, il giovedì precedente; dopo la premiazione nella domenica successiva, il rientro è avvenuto il lunedì. Uno dei partecipanti è stato imbarcato sul catamarano di Gwennili, Associazione benefica molto attiva nel promuovere in Gran Bretagna la vela per o disabili, con il supporto di un generoso amico britannico. Il resto del gruppo ha partecipato con un'imbarcazione charterizzata in loco dalla Fellowship.

Ulteriore obbiettivo del progetto è quello di far partecipare alla Barcolana a Trieste due veliste e due velisti Britannici, assieme ad un rappresentante del Rotary Club di Cowes; gli amici della spedizione italiana a Cowes li ospiteranno sulle loro imbarcazioni.

Like every year at the beginning of October, once again the port of Trieste has been covered by a sea ... of boats! 2101 boats in fact found themselves in the spirit of the Barcolana, a regatta of friendship that goes beyond geographical boundaries and stazzi! Common goal: sport and friendship, racing for the pleasure of enjoying a breathtaking spectacle, multicolor sails and spinnakers that look like kites ...all after 49 years from that fateful day when a group of friends, almost for challenge, decided to start a small autumn regatta from the small port of Barcola ... never imagining that it would become the biggest regatta in the world. This year, in fact, the Guinness World Records record was reached with 2101 boats! And how was I, as a small beginner of the Navy League of Naples and iyforiana of the Fleet of Naples South West, to classified third place on 150 registered meteor and 363 in general position? Mine was a true adventure from lyforiana under the passion of sailing, with some friends I found myself in Trieste with the aim of getting overwhelmed by that spirit sailor and goliardic that underlies the Barcolana. The evening before the actual Regatta we go to perfect our registration at the Club of Barcola and Gragnola. Once in the office, the lyphorian leader stands out in front of me! I can photograph it in the chaos of general inscriptions. "It will be my lucky charm for this adventure!" - I thought inside of me. After preparing "Cloud" our celestial meteor, at best, we decide to participate in the "Barcolana by night", reserved for Meteors. A sky and a sea in pastel tones torn at sunset by some of the thousand sails ... this is the background of our race course, where we practice for the next day. From the Zero pier to the Audace pier only a few miles; a couple of edges, and here are some friends who encourage us from the dock; but even during navigation, skipper of boats of the same category will smile at you, call you from afar, and warn you of some risk at sea ... the spirit is the right one, while the wind begins to fall, the Bora, this time, you do not It is made to feel. We return among the lights of Trieste, which lights up, the magnificent Piazza dell'Unità di Italia that continues to shine from afar, despite the thousands of boats seem to cover it.

AREA 1 NEWS

October 8: the day of the Barcolana! I rush in with my crew back to Molo Zero. After a double macchiato (or a double head in B as they say here in Trieste) we begin to set ourselves up for racing. Even the sky seems almost ready, but the wind is always scarce.

It will be necessary to find some pressure points so as not to stand still. We begin to see a show in the distance: 10, 100, 1000, 2100 boats around us ... here is the magic of the Barcolana. We are dragged on a starting line where there are all categories ... and so you can see a living picture, a carpet of sails, that sail free. Small boats, big but small compared to the super Mega Yachts, even the legendary Moro di Venezia and the superfavorite Spirit of Porto Piccolo by the Benussi Brothers. Here we are. Our tactic studies, in spite of all the forecasts, a boat departure jury, walls to the left. At the start signal, one of the boats inevitably pummels on us to gain space on the buoy, its shrouds are stranded between our crosses and we risk disarranging. A candlestick is folded but we do not stop. Promptly we put ourselves into action and we can start off in the maneuver, upwind. The sea of Trieste is colored white, sails everywhere. I remember while I was in the position of a halyard, I turned a moment and saw thousands of boats chasing us. Then the second edge, that of the stern, with all the spinnakers open towards the Castle of Miramare. The white sea becomes colorful. I still remember hearing the announcements of the boats that were withdrawing by radio, and that pushed us even more to insist on our race. I remember the sounds, the whistle of the wind, and the sweet breaking of the waves on Cloud, but also the screams of the other participants, who gave themselves orders at a distance, of those who fiercely shouted "Water! Water!". An incredible experience, fun but also very surreal. After about 3h30 we can reach the last mark! Tired but still with the adrenaline on us we head towards the pier Audace and there, without knowing yet our result, we exult with a bottle of prosecco, watering the friends on the dock! We will discover only in the late afternoon of having arrived third category. Incredulous, immensely happy, I see myself with my crew to celebrate along the streets of Trieste. The Sailors' Village is now filled with crowds and cheerfulness. At the end of the day, I reopen the photos and I see the Guidone degli lyforiani that made me lucky. An indescribable feeling, a few lines and photos can only give a vague idea of what the passion for the sea and sailing can give. After this experience, the dream of the most beautiful regatta remains and continues. What do I still want? Participate next year, with friends lyforiani, the 50th anniversary of the Barcolana!

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ISRAEL FLEET REPORT







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The Israel Fleet has had two months involved with 'big ships'. In October, at the Garden Hotel, they had an excellent and fascinating lecture given by Capt. IgalMaor, Administration of Shipping Ports General Director, at the Ministry of Transport of the State of Israel. He spoke about International Movement among theTen Biggest Shipping Companies in the World, which included COSCO (China Ocean Shipping (Group) Company). This company was founded in 1961 and now handles 1,539,618 TEU (Twenty-foot Equivalent Unit) with an annual revenue of 10.2 billion USD. It has 130,000 employees and is now the world's 4th largest shipping company outside Europe and one of only four companies which has a total capacity above one million TEU.


Among its fleet of 1114 ships, of which 285 are container ships, COSCO owns 5 of the top 10 biggest container ships, each of which is able to handle 19,000 twenty-foot containers.

In November,GidiYanai - Commodore of IYFR Israel, Turkey & Greece and his wife Haya, together with Isabelle Goldstein - Commodore of the IYFR Israel Fleet and her husband Harry, were cordially welcomed by the British Ambassador and Commodore James Morley to visit the British Royal Navy & Standing NATO Maritime Group 2 Flagship 'HMS Ocean', while it was docked in Haifa Port in Israel between Thursday 30 NovemberandMonday 4 December.It took part in several joint exercises with the Israel Navy and Air Forces.

It was explained to guests that the Standing NATO Maritime Groups (SNMG) is a multinational, integrated maritime force, made up of vessels from various allied countries, who also help to establish a NATO presence and demonstrate solidarity.







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28 YEARS AGO. A WILD MANEUVER BY PIC AND CAPTAIN ITALIAN NAVY (R) SERGIO SANTI



April 1989, on board of the ITS AMERIGO VESPUCCI, some 30 miles south of Athens where we are expected at the harbor of Piraeus entrance the next morning at 0800 square, to start the 21 salute gun salvoes. It is an official visit to Greece.


Imagine sailing in a fair easterly breeze on a NNW heading in a beautiful star lighted night, sea force negligible. With all the

mainmast and foremast square sails unfurled, we are making a good speed of almost six KTS. Being a traffic congested area we do not want to run any risk with the approaching ships. We are a sailing ship, sailing on sails and both masts are flood lighted. Great sight from our deck. Imagine from outside. Glorious night to be sailing, watch from 2000 to midnight, young but a smart LTJG as OOD, lot of traffic inbound to Athens and the same on the southerly tracks due to the Aegean Islands outbound and inbound traffic.

You can recognize the liners and the ferries because of their lighting: Christmas trees are less lighted! Their running lights are really difficult to be detected among all the others.

I hate to seat alone in the luxurious and exclusive Sala Consiglio (Captain's Wardroom), and have my meals alone as the tradition would dictate.

So, after a beautiful dinner with a few Officers and the Chief Senior Bosun as special Guest, a final toast to the Harbor we will be visiting in the next days, I pass by my cabin grab my leather flight jacket, cap and binoculars and decide to have a relaxing stroll on the quarterdeck before hitting my bunk.



Tomorrow is going to be a busy day as any arrival day in a foreign Port. I want also to control the traffic situation and admire the great and beautiful panorama of our full-lighted sails; definitively we are visible and recognizable as a sailing vessel ... actually going on sail. We do not want to run any risk: we can only go port. Our yards are already fully braced to port. Ten, fifteen degrees to starboard would mean to have nine big square sails in stays; some 2.000 square yards!

The young OOD duly reports the sails situation, speed and traffic. Nothing that the Bosun and I, savoring a cigarette, do not see and know. However, this is what the OOD is supposed to do when the Captain is on his bridge wing or by the wheelhouse. There, 8 midshipmen of the watch are steering the Ship's four huge rudder wheels that move directly and unassisted the huge 20 plus square meters 7,5 meters high rudder.



"Captain, we got four targets (in a Military Navy any other floating object different from your Ship is a TARGET) on our port side: three on opposite course showing red lights. The one with a green light is reaching and is much faster than we are; should not give any problem. On our starboard side we have two Ferries and a cargo. Both ferries at two hours are showing their green lights. The closer seems to be willing to pass still closer to us. The other is approaching fast and being almost on the same bearing of the closer ferry, it is expected that we will lose the sight of the green light that, at the moment, is just astern the fantail of the closer ship.

Time to relax for a few seconds. Situation is under control; since I am on the starboard wing bridge, the OOD excuses and goes the other side.





A few puffs and all of the sudden, instead of 2 green lights on our starboard side ... we got only one and after a few second a new damn red light pops up some 45 degrees on our starboard side no more than 800 yards distant.

ARE THEY MAD? This is my first thought. What the hell are they doing? I realize that the OOD has just come beneath the SBD wing: he too has noticed the maneuver while on the port wing. We have the right of the way... but we are on a collision course... I understand that I myself have to take action. OK... I yell.... I GOT IT!!! HARD TO STARBOARD!!! AND DO IT AS FAST AS YOU CAN!!!

It is a clear emergency situation: in seconds we will lose our thrust, the sails in stays, forcing into the rigging and the ship will maneuver no more. GIVE THEM ONE BLAST! AND PREPARE TO MANEUVER ON ENGINES!!!

Nice and well trained Crew! Reaction is immediate the Ship majestically starts to come to STB. Immediately starts the scream of the flapping heavy canvas. Let us keep the fingers crossed with the rigging!



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The reassuring engine starting noise is covered by the angry and deafening horn blast. The Chief Bosun signals "all hands in place" with his whistle. In seconds, three reassuring whistles come back: the masts Captains are ready to take any action.

Fortunately, the closest Ferry has understood my maneuver and turns away: unbelievable how many flashes from their amazed passenger's cameras.

The other one is still on our STB showing his red light, we are on opposite courses, too damn close, she too gives one blast... at least they have understood: we will not collide!

The wind is not so strong as to damage our sails and rigging but it pushes us backwards and I have to do something to come out of the stall situation. Our 4000 tons are difficult to govern in that ugly situation. I decide not to move any yard while the 2jibs and the foresail will lend a hand in completing the right turn. So, (very) much calmer than before I order AHEAD FLANK for less than two minutes. The dependable engines do the rest and I leave the maneuver to the OOD as soon as the sails get the wind. I cannot repeat what I yelled to the Ferry Captain on Channel 16: to define it rude and terribly impolite is just a most poor understatement. The smart ass justified saying that it was his intention to give his passengers a better and closer view of the sailing vessel. I tell you: spinning around a three masts 4.000 tons Vessel, under sails... is quite an experience!



A DANGEROUS ANECDOTE BY WALTER EAGLEHURST REGIONAL COMMODORE SOUTH AMERICA

It was in the middle of winter, on June 30, 1995, South Pacific Ocean, when I felt immensely happy sailing from Algarrobo to Antofagasta, crossing 700 nautical miles on my Dufour 3800 sailboat, baptized as "El Galeón", recently bought, along with three friends, accompanied in this new adventure. We were 20 miles from the coast, 300 miles from Valparaiso, it was getting dark. Previously I had three sailboats, but this was the first time I had a sailboat with wheel rudder, which made it more special.

After two days of sailing, two members of the crew were totally dizzy and asleep in their cabins, the other member of the crew, rather it was a passenger, since he did not know anything about navigation, he accompanied me outside in the cockpit.

The autopilot kept the course 0° north firm and safe, although the waves did not stop and made our ship go up and down the crest of an endless row of waves. The south wind began to blow with more force and I committed the imprudence of going ahead, to the bow, installing the Tangón and performing the maneuver "Oreja de Burro" to take better advantage of the wind. When I took the stick with both arms to catch the fist of Genoa, I lost my balance and fell down into the water with spinnaker and everything, everything was so fast and unexpected, that when I found myself floating in the water, I checked how fast my sailboat sailed, and how immense is the ocean. The image of the galleon shrinking toward the horizon was disturbing. Then I screamed with all my strength: WAKE UP THE OTHERS! The minutes passed and I realized that the Galleon was beginning to change; but that they were going to pick me up in the wrong place and that they had lost sight of me.

I tried to draw attention, somehow, and they did not see me, so I decided to take off my yellow waterproof jacket, put it on the pole and lift it.

It was so they could come to rescue me, after more than 20 minutes looking.

Once on board, and after the great commotion of my life, my friends miraculously cured themselves of seasickness, and they took out a cake and they sang happy birthday to me, since I was 40 years old that same day when Neptune returned me from the sea.

• UNA ANÉCDOTA PELIGROSA POR WALTER EAGLEHURST REGIONAL COMMODORE SOUTH AMERICA

Fue en pleno invierno, un 30 de junio de 1995, me sentía inmensamente feliz navegando desde Algarrobo rumbo a Antofagasta una travesía de 700 millas náuticas en mi velero Dufour 3800, bautizado como el "Galeón", recién comprado, junto a tres amigos que me acompañaban en esta nueva aventura. Nos encontrábamos a 20 millas de la costa a 300 millas de Valparaíso, ya comenzaba a atardecer.

Antes había tenido tres veleros, pero era la primera vez que tenía un velero con timón de rueda, lo que lo hacía más especial.

Después de dos días de navegación, dos de los tripulantes se encontraban totalmente mareados y dormidos en sus cabinas, el otro tripulante, más bien era un pasajero, ya que no conocía nada de navegación, me acompañaba en el cockpit.

El piloto automático mantenía firme y seguro el rumbo O ° Norte, a pesar que el oleaje no daba tregua y hacía que nuestra nave subiera y bajara por la cresta de una fila interminable de olas.

El viento Sur comenzó a soplar con más fuerzay cometí la imprudencia de ir hasta la proa,para instalar el Tangón y realizar la maniobra "Oreja de Burro", para aprovechar mejor el viento. Al tomar el tangón con los dos brazos para enganchar el puño de la Genoa, pierdo el equilibrio y me caigo al agua con tangón y todo, fue todo tan rápido e inesperado, que al encontrarme en el agua flotando, comprobé cuán rápido navegaba mi velero, y cuán inmenso es el océano. La imagen del Galeón achicándose rumbo al horizonte, fue perturbadora. Solo atiné gritar : DESPIERTA A LOS DEMÁS!! Pasaron largos los minutos y compruebo que el Galeón comenzaba a virar, pero que me iban a buscar al lugar equivocado y que me habían perdido de vista.

Trataba de llamar la atención, de alguna manera y no me divisaban, por lo que decidí sacarme la chaqueta impermeable de color amarillo, ponerla en el tangón y levantarla.

Fue así que me pudieron venir a rescatar, después de más de 20 minutos buscando.

Una vez a bordo, y pasado el gran susto de mi vida, mis amigos milagrosamente se curaron del mareo, y sacaron una torta y me cantaron feliz cumpleaños, ya que cumplía 40 años ese mismo día en que Neptuno, me devolvió desde el mar.
